

MANY Geelong residents MANY Geelong residents would remember attending wedding receptions or other functions at Sladen House at the river end of Pakington St.

Sladen House was for many years a function centre but was turned into luxury office accommodation after it was sold in the early 2000s.
Originally named Barwon

Crescent, the house was built in a Victorian Italianate mode in 1849-50 for Charles Sladen, a Geelong solicitor who later became Victorian

Premier.
Extensive additions, including dining and drawing rooms, a coach house and stables, were made in 1863.

and went into partnership
with Geelong's first solicitor,
Henry Tyssen.
Tyssen, however, died only
